GOAL

Students will improve their understanding of an active threat incident (active attack event) and better appreciate their role as well as that of first responders.

INTRODUCTION

OBJECTIVES

- 1. Correctly identify the options a citizen has when an active threat incident (active attack event) occurs.
- 2. Explain how you would use resources available to you in a given environment to protect yourself and others.
- 3. Demonstrate an accurate knowledge of ways to correctly communicate with law enforcement.

DEFINITIONS

Active Shooter (FBI):

"An active shooter is an individual actively engaged in killing or attempting to kill people in a populated area"

Active Threat / Active Attack Event

- Suspect(s) actively engaged in causing or threatening to cause death or great bodily injury to others.
- The incident location will normally contain a large number of victims and potential victims.
- The incident is active/on-going when law enforcement arrives.

Traditional Patrol Response to Critical Incidents

- Method used by Law Enforcement for several decades
- When First Responders arrive at the scene:
 - Secure the Perimeter
 - Contain the Incident
 - Help Victims
 - Gather Information
 - Wait for SWAT to arrive

This DOES NOT work with an active threat / attack.

Columbine High School

- Tuesday, April 20, 1999, 11:19 a.m.
- Littleton, CO
- Killed: 13 people
- Wounded: 20+
 people
- Both perpetrators committed suicide at 12:08 p.m.



Columbine High School April 20, 1999 TIMELINE

- 11:19 a.m.Shooting begins
- 11:22 a.m.
 Police response
- 11:29 a.m. 11:36 a.m.
 Library massacre
- 12:08 p.m.
 Perpetrators commit suicide




How many have been killed in active shooter events since 2000?

PREPAREDNESS Totals




PREPAREDNESS Incidents Per Year

Quick Look: 277 Active Shooter Incidents in the United States Between 2000 - 2018 Incidents Per Year




PREPAREDNESS Casualties Per Year

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


PREPAREDNESS Casualty Breakdown Per Year

Preparedness

 - ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate)
 - ALERRT (Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training, Texas State University)
 - CRASE (Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events)
 - ASIM (Active Shooter Incident Management)

Non-Traditional Patrol Response to Critical Incidents

- First responding officers enter immediately.
 - Locate
 - Isolate
 - Contain, and/or
 - Eliminate the threat(s)

 So how can you improve the likelihood that you and your coworkers will survive an active threat / attack event?

Surviving an Active Threat Event RUN!

- If there is an escape path, attempt to evacuate.
- Evacuate whether others agree to or not.
- Leave your belongings behind.
- Help others escape if possible.
- Prevent others from entering the area.
- Call 9-1-1 when you are safe.

Surviving an Active Threat Event HIDE!

If an evacuation is not possible, find a place to hide.

- Lock and/or blockade the door.
- Silence your cell phone.
- Hide behind large objects. (Cover/Conceal)
- Remain very quiet.

Your hiding place should:

- Be out of the shooter's view.
- Provide protection if shots are fired in your direction.
- Not trap or restrict your options for movement.

Surviving an Active Threat Event SHELTER IN PLACE vs LOCKDOWN

Shelter In Place (Lockout)

- Threat is OUTSIDE the facility
- Secure exterior entrances
- Move about freely inside
- Shelter until advised by emergency services

Lockdown

- Threat is INSIDE the facility
- Secure exterior AND interior entrances
- No free movement inside facility
- Lockdown until advised by emergency services

Surviving an Active Threat Event FIGHT!

As a last resort, and only if your life is in danger:

- Attempt to incapacitate the suspect.
- Act with physical aggression.
- Improvise weapons.
- Commit to your actions.

Remember!

Active threat suspects are looking for targets of opportunity that involve mass casualties consisting of soft targets.

Are they more likely to attack you if you are attempting to flee or if you have barricaded yourself?
